THE SANITARY INSTITUTE.

VISIT TO THE "C.R." LAUNDRY AT HARRINGAY

A large party of students, who had previously visited several institutions, disinfecting stations, &c., in the Borough of Islington, as arranged by the Sanitary Institute of Great Britain, paid a visit to the "C.R." Sanitary Laundry, Green lanes, on Wednesday afternoon last. Accompanied by Mr. James R. Leggatt, of the Public Health Department of Islington, the party arrived at the laundry about 4.30, and were received by the deputy-chairman, Mr. Blake, P. Allnatt, Mr. James W. Cowling (managing director), and Mr. F. Litchfield (secretary).

For over an hour the party were occupied in a careful inspection of the laundry, and frequently expressed themselves highly pleased with the sanitary arrangements, machinery, colour and finish of the linen, and everything appertaining to the working of the laundry.

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The visitors were then invited to tea, after which Mr. Leggatt, in moving a vote of thanks to the directors for their hospitality, and to Mr. Cowling for his courtesy, referred to the excellent conditions under which the work of the laundry was carried out, and especially to the healthy and happy appearance of the workers, which indicated the excellent feeling between employees and employer. He also referred to the admirable arrangements made by the directors for the workers to partake of their meals in comfort, in a building specially erected and fitted up for the purpose. He also expressed his pleasure in meeting Dr. Butler Hogan, the esteemed medical officer of health for Tottenham, as he recognised that in bringing the students to Tottenham he was out of his district, but having regard to the fact that Mr. Cowling, the managing director, had been associated with him in public health work in Islington for over twelve years, he had arranged this visit in order that the students might see a model laundry in every respect.

Mr. Cowling, in replying, said it was a source of great pleasure to meet so many intending candidates for sanitary work, and he wished them every success in their forthcoming examinations. He also extended them a hearty invitation to visit the laundry at any time, and bring any friends with them who wished to obtain an insight of the working of a large laundry.

Among the other visitors present were Miss Gray, the lady health inspector of Islington, and the Rev. H. Wase Whitfield, vicar of Christ Church, Tottenham.
